

Some jobs are more dangerous than others. The above chart shows the number of deaths in the top ten most dangerous jobs in America for 2016. There are two ways to measure these deaths. The first is the total number of workers who died in each job (the right axis). The second is the proportion of workers who were killed (the left axis). This is usually measured as the number of workers per 100,000

The two most dangerous jobs in 2016 were logging (cutting down trees) and fishing. 91 and 24 people died in each industry respectively. As both of these are fairly small industries, the rates were 135.9 and 86 deaths per 100,000 workers. Roofers were fourth with a total of 101 deaths, and about 49 deaths per 100,000. The highest number of deaths was amongst truckers and drivers, at 918, or 24.7 deaths per 100,000. The only two other jobs to have over 200 deaths were farm workers and grounds workers (people who work in gardens, parks and so

Jobs that fortunately didn't make it onto the list include police and fire fighters — jobs typically seen as dangerous. One job in particular we don't normally think of as dangerous was in the top ten — trash collectors. In fact, 31 collectors died, or just over 34 deaths per 100,000 workers.
